TWS Annual Conference Travel Award - Jessica Lang

This past fall, I was able to attend the American Fisheries and The Wildlife Society 2019 Joint Annual Conference in Reno, Nevada, which welcomed close to 5,000 fish and wildlife biologists. I was very fortunate to start the conference off by visiting the Palomino Valley Wild Horse and Burro Center, which is the largest BLM adoption center for wild equids in the United States. In the following days, I attended many great presentations and events with students and wildlife professionals from across the globe. I was so blown away by the incredible diversity of wildlife research projects that I filled my conference notebook by the second day.





In addition to attending many great presentations, I also participated in several hands-on workshops, including "Animal Capture Techniques for Researchers and Managers" and "Spatial Sampling and Study Design". While I enjoyed every aspect of the conference, I especially loved all of the networking opportunities, such as the Canadian Section and Friends reception, the student-professional networking event, and the Women in Wildlife reception. On the last day of the conference, I presented research from my Master's thesis (University of Manitoba), which examined the impacts of red fox denning on vegetation in the Canadian Subarctic.

I am extremely grateful to The Wildlife Society-Manitoba Chapter for awarding me with the TWS Annual Conference Travel Award, which ultimately made it possible for me to attend this conference. This conference was the highlight of my year, and I am already counting down the days until the next annual conference in Louisville, Kentucky!

The Annual Winter Getaway is coming up this Feb. 7-9 in Pinawa!


Registration is now open until midnight on February 1st.
